




## What are Social Determinants of Health (SDOH)?

The social determinants of health are the conditions in which people are born, grow, live, work and age. These circumstances are shaped by the distribution of money, power and resources at global, national and local levels.




# Primary Medical Care

Cultural activities/universal approach/tribal specific!










# Dental outreach in Guadalupe















## Recommendations

- •Increase funding for Indian Health Services
- Encourage projects to promote American Indian/Alaskan Native culture in every aspect of their services.
- •Fund projects that encourage collaboration between tribal communities and urban communities and allow for technology advancements to increase cultural interventions to continue to be used to engage more AI/AN
- •Decrease barriers to care and encourage allowable billing to continue for telephonic/telehealth to assist tribal members and decrease barriers to medical, behavioral health and dental care and community prevention programs for AI/AN.
- •Allow for prevention services that include culture to be billable or reimbursable to I.H.S Medicaid/Medicare so cultural interventions related to public health for AI/AK will be sustainable.
